



STREET PHOTOGRAPHY SIG

DAVID AUSTON & CHRIS SEATON

What is Street Photography? Although not rigorously defined, street photography is typically about candid photography in public places. It may be about people, places or both and need not be on a street nor in a city. The defining elements of the genre are its candid and serendipitous qualities, which make it both challenging and rewarding. Beginners are often stricken with shyness and a fear of offending people. However, with a little practice and some simple guiding principles, along with the support of like minded Group members, it can become a delightful way to develop your photography skills and have some fun doing so.

What will the Group Do? The main activity of the group will be field trips around Santa Barbara and nearby communities. These will be 1/2 day in duration (one day if going farther afield such as LA). Members will share their images on the Flickr website and once a month the group will meet at Valle Verde for 1/2 day to discuss different approaches to Street Photography and share examples of their camera work and processing techniques (both b&w and color).

Membership. Any dues paying member of the Club will be eligible to join the Group. No experience is necessary nor is any special equipment needed. We do ask, however that members make a commitment to participate in most of the field trips and meetings. Depending on the interest level, it may be necessary to limit the membership to approximately 12 to 15 people to ensure that the field trips and meetings are beneficial to all participants.

DEB KALAS -"The Wild Herd a Vanishing American Treasure"

At the heart of this story is a passionate love affair. At the age of 3, Deborah Kalas was swept into the world of horses, and right away she had a deep respect for their beauty and power, and she had a keen sense of their intelligence and human-like family interactions.



She began photography as a teen and eventually worked for magazines like Life and People documenting the human experience. Over the years, her love and understanding of horses deepened. Then in 2014 she made her first trip to the Theodore Roosevelt National Park, in North Dakota, and there, for the first time, she encountered herds of horses running wild and free, as Nature intended, and then and there Deb's life was profoundly changed.

With abandon, she threw herself into photographing the wild herds and discovering how their habits and interactions move through the seasons and colors of the year and the seasons and colors of their lives. Soon her work photographing and learning turned into a life mission: To help all of us understand the essence and spirit of these magnificent animals and to encourage us to protect this unique part of our American heritage.

Her presentation addresses the interests of photographers and horse lovers alike. For photographers, the presentation will cover; gear, settings, composition and steps to bookmaking. For horse lovers; the story behind some of the images, the challenges the horses face with each season, the life cycle of a wild horse and understanding their behavior. There will be time for questions afterward and Deborah will be signing books.





The males steal stones from other nest to add to their own. On an island photographing these birds I noticed that they were suddenly all running away from the shore. I looked across the bay and saw a major caving from the ice shelf creating a large wave heading our way. I joined the penguins running inland.

Tourism is a growing industry. In one restaurant we cooked our own steak. The waiter brought an individual hot plate and a raw steak to our table and it was up us to cook it to our taste.
