A Reminder About Image Sizes

There is no required file size for exhibition entries, however, submissions that are <u>under 2400 pixels horizontally or 1600 pixels vertically</u> may not display sharply in the judge's gallery. Conversely, images **over** 3840 pixels horizontally or 2160 pixels vertically provide no significant advantage.

Exhibition Night File Naming Protocol

The current file-naming protocol for exhibition submissions is: **CAT Title by Firstname Lastname**

Note that underscores [_], dashes [-], %% symbols, and periods **are not necessary** and discouraged unless they are an explicit part of the title. Here's an example:

NAT Fall Colors in Antarctica by Ernie Shakleton

The 3-letter (ALL CAPS) category abbreviations are simply the first three letters of the category: CRE, NAT, OPE, PEO

Submissions with incorrect file names may be rejected or returned for correction.

Expanded Nature Submission Info

During four months this year, the The Exhibition Night Nature Category was expanded to include some subjects and techniques not previously allowed. For exhibitions for some months in **2024**, we expect to allow members to continue submitting Expanded Nature images that go beyond our current Nature Rules. Stay tuned for details about which months will be open to this option.

Here's what you can do differently with your Nature submissions in those months:

- The Expanded Nature option allows for the depiction of the intersection of nature and humans.
- Images may depict subjects that have adapted to an environment modified by humans, where these human elements are an integral part of the nature story; or where the human elements are in situations depicting natural forces, like hurricanes or tidal waves; and..., well, it's up to you.
- Solid black and solid white backgrounds and studio shots are allowed in Expanded Nature.
- Humans as non-essential subjects and/or human-made elements that contribute to the storytelling nature of the image are allowed.
- The removal of minor, distracting elements or defects (dust spots) is also allowed.

Note that all Expanded Nature images will be scored as Nature submissions and no changes to end-of-the-year recognition are being made... just a few opportunities to expand what you present as "Nature."







FIELD TRIP TO SANTA BARBARA MUSEUM OF ART REPORT PHOTOGRAPHS OF ELLSWORTH KELLY



This landmark exhibition features 60 photographs artist Ellsworth Kelly (1923–2015), who perceptively created a commanding body of abstract art drawn from forms he found in the everyday world. Extraordinary works of art in their own right, Kelly's photographs allow viewers to precisely see how the artist registered the shapes, shadows, and other visual phenomena that resonated within his work in other media over seven decades. This is the very first museum exhibition solely devoted to Kelly's photographs.

The 14 club members enjoyed the museum docents' backstories into the what, why, and where he created his work. Kelly was primarily a painter but used his photography as a sketchbook, studying how light and shadows could assist his approach in creating his paintings.

The club members left with a deeper understanding of Kelley's approach to creating art. If you missed the field trip the exhibition is available at the museum until January 2024.

Searching for Shorebirds

Greetings,

November already and it is in the mid to upper 70's. Warm, and dry, the beginning of fall, and we fall back an hour with the time. What has this to do with bird photography? Well, a heck of a lot I would imagine. Now we get to the time of year when we have interesting light, the foliage turns to color, and the animals and birds begin to think about what's to come. So what's to come? This month's theme will once again be Birds in Their Environment. Take advantage of the morning light to visit the seashore or a local lake or pond. Ducks, usually active in the morning at this time of year, are a great subject matter and for a really dynamic image you need to try to be at water level, get down low in other words, to get a ducks view of their environment. Isolate the duck on the water to bring attention to it. If getting low is not possible then try for in-flight photos. Ducks in flight in the morning light are always a good bet. Be patient. Watch the direction of the light. Watch for distracting backgrounds. Or...go to the seashore...does anybody call it seashore anymore?...should we just call it the beach? I tend to like the seashore, it's a bit more gentile but then again that's me. Anyway get to it and I am sure there will be plenty of opportunities there. If you need to see an example of a beautiful bird at the seashore images see club member Sally Berry's portfolio.

TECH TALK:

If you don't have the best memory card for your camera, then you're not going to get the most out of your photoshoots. With so many options for speed, capacity, brand, compatibility, and price available, you might initially feel overwhelmed. However, we've broken down the best memory cards available to show you which ones are best for you.

When you think of a memory card, you'll likely find that the popular SD card format comes to mind. However, if you're using a newer camera, or one of the <u>best professional cameras</u>, then you'll likely need to look for a CFexpress or XQD card. However, Compact Flash, microSD and CFast cards are still all regularly used as well.

One of the most obvious ways to differentiate between memory cards is how much storage they have. A 16GB card might be fine for an afternoon wandering around your local wildlife reserve, but videographers looking to shoot all day could get frustrated with having to constantly swap over cards.

However, this isn't the only way to judge what memory card is best, as you'll also need a card with fast read and write speeds. This will not only affect how quickly you can transfer images from the memory card to your computer (or one of the best portable hard drives), but it will also impact the burst mode on your camera. If your memory card isn't fast enough, you'll find that it will lag and struggle to accomplish the blisteringly-fast shooting speeds that some of the latest cameras are capable of.

If you're shooting raw files you want a card that can handle sequential bursts of the highest quality imagery, as well as a capacity that allows for sufficient storage to avoid having to swap cards every five minutes.

The **Transcend SDXC UHS-II U3** is a belter that delivers whether you're shooting raw files or high-resolution video. While the 64GB maximum capacity (the alternative being 32GB) may appear a little modest at first compared with other options here, the performance is anything but, with blisteringly swift read and write times of 285MB/s and 180 MB/s respectively.

Capable of working with a UHS-II compatible DSLR or camcorder, speeds are up to 3x faster than standard UHS-I SD memory cards. This card is also shock and X-ray-proof, giving enthusiasts and prosadded peace of mind.

SanDisk's Extreme range of SD cards come in both standard and Pro versions. Naturally, the Pro cards are slightly more expensive, but even this regular Extreme card features UHS Speed Class 3 compatibility to be able to cope with both Full HD and 4K recording.

A 16GB SanDisk Extreme card can offer data read speeds of up to 90MB/s and write speeds of up to 40MB/s. While these aren't mind-blowing numbers, they're perfectly suitable for most photography needs. Outdoor photographers will be pleased that these cards are also water, shock, temperature and X-ray proof. If you have no need for blisteringly fast read/write speeds, the SanDisk Extreme range is a great option at reasonable prices.

If you're a photo enthusiast passionate about your hobby, then you could do worse than picking up the **Extreme PRO SDXC** card from industry stalwart SanDisk. This unassuming card is one of the best SD memory cards you can choose, with capacities ranging from 32GB to a staggering 1TB and an impressive UHS Speed Class 3 rating.

However, the most impressive aspect of the Extreme PRO SDXC card is its write speeds of up to 90MB/s, which allows your camera to handle rapid-fire sequential shooting in both JPEG and RAW with ease. Meanwhile, its rapid 170MB/s read speed is perfect for a refreshingly fast workflow.

Aside from capturing Raw photographs, the data crunching on offer with this memory card also makes it suitable for 4K video capture. In short, this is a great, reliable all-rounder – and its price makes it hard to beat.

Lexar has long been a go-to card brand for photo enthusiasts, with this pro card being top of the tree for us, deploying UHS-II tech to enable read speeds up to 300MB/s and 260MB/s write speeds.

So whether you're shooting Full HD, 4K video, or high-resolution Raw files, this card is eminently suitable, even if maximum capacity is 128GB, rather than the 512GB-1TB offered by some rivals. A close match for SanDisk's Extreme PRO SD UHS-II (also featured here), in terms of performance and spec, we similarly can't really go wrong with one of the best memory card options out there right now.

Kingston Technology offers a fairly limited collection of memory cards with just three SD card series and three microSD series. The **Canvas React Plus** series is the flagship line of SD cards with capacities of 32GB, 64GB, 128GB and 256GB.

After using the 128GB Kingston Canvas React Plus SD card extensively, I can say without reservation that it's reliable. It has performed flawlessly when I've shot on high-resolution cameras like the 45.7MP Nikon Z7 II at its fastest rate (10fps) and when shooting 4K video. It's also proved capable of recording 8K video, however, it doesn't allow the most demanding formats like 8K raw.

PNY has four SD card series and the **X-Pro 90 SDXC UHS-II** cards are the flagship offerings. They are available in three capacities, 64GB, 128GB and 256GB, each with claimed maximum read speeds of up to 300MB/s and writes speeds up to 280MB/s.

In addition, as V90 cards, the minimum read and write speeds are 90MB/s, making them suitable for recording high-resolution stills at fast continuous shooting rates as well as 4K video and some 8K video.

The X-Pro 90 SDXC UHS-II also produced some of the best figures I've seen with an SDXC card in software testing, enables very good in-camera burst depths and is snappy at transferring images to a computer.


